Delegate Report for BOD October 24-25, 2014

We meet in Nashville for the October Board of Directors meeting. The item that caused the most buzz was when guest speaker Mario Heinen President of CONFEPASO delivered his speech. I believe most of us thought he was just going to tell us more about CONFEPASO but as it turns out he was there to tell us they want PFHA to send rule changes by Dec. 31st. Apparently they are wanting all countries to use an International Rulebook instead of our own rulebooks at ALL shows held in the US and other countries. Now if you have never been to a CONFEPASO Mundial show (World Cup) they run the Mundial totally different than we do at PFHA shows. Just to name a few differences 1) No Pintos or high white markings, 2) Height restrictions on too short, 3) All horses must be shod, 4) Vet & Farrier inspection before all classes. That is just a few where we will disagree. Personally I can't see PFHA members agreeing to change the way we do it here. It has always been an option that if you want to show at the Mundial then you would follow their rules, show at PFHA shows follow our rules. It will be interesting to see what happens and if the demand we change or leave the organization.

The second biggest buzz was over the new

computer system. Jose Colon gave a demo of what it will do and I have to say it looks AWESOME! They are looking at a full operational January 1st, the office staff will be trained December 9th.

I as Recreational Rider Chair proposed a new program called the Sport Horse Program where horses that compete in Open Breed or Open Gaited classes can earn points towards a year end High Point in 8 categories. I will include the info in the newsletter. This passed unanimously and will start up hopefully in the before the end of November. We will be proposing a rule change that the points earned will go towards the lifetime points for the horse, like TOP. This will be retroactive to the start of the program since it will be 2016 when it is voted on and effective 2017.

Finance Committee reported that we are doing good and are in the black. Registrations, memberships, and transfers are all up for 2014. Let us hope the trends continues for 2015. January 1, 2014 we had 3424 members as of September 1st we have 4436 members. Registrations January 1st –Sept 1st 381 completed, 157 pending, Transfers 816 and DNA kits 439.

PFHA has been a Corporate Entity in Tennessee

for many years and it was voted on to move it to Kentucky since that is where the office exists. Doesn't change anything except if a lawsuit arises then our attorney can take care of it instead of hiring one in Tennessee.

At the January meeting possible other sites for the Nationals will be presented. The 2014 Nationals figures are not all in right now but it looks to have made about \$100,000. There were a little over 500 horses attending. The number of entries by division were Pleasure 301, Performance 204, Fino 181, Youth 149, Bella Forma 51 and other classes (Specialty, Futurity etc) 128 for a total of 1014 entries. There will be 18 more classes this show season with the addition of the 5-6 Year old classes so once again they are looking to combine small classes or cancel those that are consistently low. Another option is splitting out the Youth and having their own Nationals. Divisional judging, going back to all sexes combined Championships was also discussed.

Election of Officers is at the January 2015 Membership meeting. A motion as made and passed to mail every member an absentee ballot. For those of you that haven't heard I am running for Secretary. At this meeting for the first time that I know of there was a Candidates Forum on Saturday, Cont.pg 4



Labor Day Parade

There is a little town in Oklahoma called Henryetta, population 6000. It might not have a big population but it is a famous town in Oklahoma. Their Labor Day Parade is considered one of the largest in the state. The whole weekend is billed as The Living Legends Rodeo Labor Day Weekend. The weekend is filled with carnivals, 2 nights of rodeo, beauty pageants, games, Frog Hopping Contest, Terrapin races and many special events.

On Labor Day September 1st, 2014 three good friends and their Paso Finos loaded up and represented High Plains Paso Fino Region. Sandi Agee Lofton riding El Paco, Jackie Bates riding Cohete HG, and Tonia Colburn riding Belita de Heart of Gold. The day was overcast and temperatures were in the low 90's. After we tacked up we proceeded to the start of the parade. We met new horses and friends. Somehow while

entries were taking their places in the line up, we got behind a 4-Wheeler and Dirt Bike Club and in front of a Semi pulling a float of screaming young people. For two of the Paso Finos, it was their first Parade and for the other it was only their second Parade. We all looked at each other and wondered why we left our helmets back at the trailer? I guess we had looking good on our minds? The Parade was close to 2 hours through down town Main

Street. Even with all the loud revving and varoom from the Dirt Bikes in front of us and a couple of toots of the air brakes from the semi behind us our Paso Fino Horses were troopers, and made us look good and proud. The 2014 Henryetta Labor Day Parade was well

attended from one end of Main Street to the other; people were sitting on curbs, in lawn chairs or standing around as the annual Labor Day Parade kicked off. Young and old were on hand to enjoy the sights and sounds of the celebration. The Parade



was a success and we look forward to many more. We were escorted out of town on horseback by the local Continued pg 4

Sheriff and his Deputy.

A few of the famous town legends include 16-time World Champion Cowboy and inventor of the mechanical bull Jim Shoulders. You can't talk about Henryetta without talking about Jim Shoulders. Called the Babe Ruth of professional rodeo, he rode bucking broncos and snorting bulls to a record 16 world-championship titles. Throughout the 1950s he dominated the sport. He was honored four times as the Rodeo Cowboys Association Champion Bareback Bronc Rider (1950, 1956-1958), five times as All-Around Champion Cowboy (1949, 1956-1959), and seven times as Champion Bull Rider (1951, 1954-1959). After retiring, he stayed active in the rodeo world. The Shoulders ranch south of Henryetta produced rodeos and provided contract livestock. He once owned the legendary bull Tornado, which was ridden only once in six years' competition.

(Tornado is buried on the grounds of the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City. In 1962 Shoulders retired to his ranch in Henryetta where he opened a rodeo school that provided six-day courses in saddle bronc, bareback bronc, and bull riding for potential professional rodeo hands. He died of heart disease in 2007.

Terry Don West, climbed onto a dairy calf when he was four years old on his parent's dairy farm then entered his first rodeo when he was just seven years old. Since then he has set the bull riding standards for everyone else to follow. West was the 1985 and 1991 IPRA World Champion Bull Rider, took the PRCA Reserve World Champion title in 1995 then followed that up the next year with the PRCA World Champion trophy. He repeated that win again in 2003.

There's another Cowboy that calls Henryetta home but this one is more comfortable on a gridiron instead of a rodeo arena. Troy Aikman, The grid star quarterbacked the Henryetta Hens to championships and was an All-State football and baseball player. He graduated in 1984 then turned down the New York Mets draft offer and walked onto the University of Oklahoma football field to the delight of Sooner fans. Suffering from a broken leg, he had to watch from the sidelines in 1985 as the Sooners won the 1985 NCAA title. Troy Aikman went on the play quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys leading the team to 3 Super Bowl Victories.

Mint Julep Time!

I have been riding since I was 3 years old and when I got my first pony, an Americana, at age 4, it was all over. By age 5, I was a regular at the local fun show club doing every event I could, including horsemanship, barrels, pole bending and on and on. If there wasn't an age classification for adults, we were competing in whatever they offered. My room filled with recycled trophies and hundreds of ribbons and various costumes for parades and demos and whatever else I could drag my pony along to do, including driving. When I was 5, my parents had purchased/rescued from slaughter two Peruvian Pasos who were half-brothers and identical! They became Uno and Dos and they were my parents' way of keeping up with me and my horse obsession. When I was almost 10, we had to retire my pony

as we were getting interested in competitive trail riding and found out that he was closer to 30--10 years older than we had thought!

In came my first Paso Fino, Sevilla, (who became Ken, Lenora and Jill Schuldt's first Paso Fino!) who was a great little mare for me to get started in competitive trail rides. Soon though, I needed a horse that would take me further and I began riding Companero de Osada (out of Brilliante de Negro) and then moved on to Dos before riding the most wonderful horse, Flint Oak Macrame (Majestuoso). I now have my girls, Dominique (Domino Cabal) and Esmerelda de Carmin (Carnaval de Carmin).

Having always wanted to go to the Paso Fino Nationals and with the fun of Esmerelda and her daughter (Terciopele Negro "Black Velvet") having successfully shown at Nationals, it was

time to make it happen, so two years ago, in 2012, I made it to Nationals in Kentucky for vacation (dragging my non-horsey significant other, Miles, with me). I had been to Kentucky about 13 years prior for Equitana and had fallen in love with the state! I had

contemplated moving there and going into the horse industry but the humidity talked me out of it. Kentucky is horse heaven! Anyone who loves horses MUST visit the state; it is scenic, historic and horsey!

There are so many horse attractions which can entertain just about anyone, including Miles. Churchill Downs, the home of the Kentucky Derby, is like visiting Mecca. To walk in the same tracks as so many famous horses, jockeys and owners was almost beyond my comprehension. My first trip to Churchill Downs resulted in me meeting my favorite jockey, Pat Day, and getting his autograph and picture of me standing next to him. I also saw Silver Charm working out on the track. Taking a tour of the backside of the track is worth it! You can learn so much about the facility and its operation and appreciate the experience (and TV coverage) that much more. Seeing the famous track for the second time was just as thrilling as seeing it the first time! Try to go in the morning when they are working horses and listen to the pounding of the hooves as the creep up to your position on the rail and fly by you with heavy breathing. It is such a thrill to think you are watching horses thunder down the stretch that is so historic thanks to the annual Kentucky Derby! The Kentucky Derby Museum is also amazing and

you must finish your experience off with a mint julep served in an official Kentucky Derby glass (I collect those and have them going back into the 1940's!).

A visit to Keeneland is needed as well. It is a very different racetrack than Churchill Downs but popular, nonetheless. The drive is very enjoyable and it takes you exploring right by the infamous Calumet Farm with its white buildings and red trim. A tour there is for my next trip as this last time included a tour of Claiborne Farm where the legendary Secretariat is buried with an ever present wreath of red roses decorating his



gravesite. Secretariat was foaled at the farm and spent his retirement there as well and you can see the stall in which he occupied and take a picture of his brass nameplate. The farm (and the wonderful tour guide who is normally part of the 80 staff that run the enormous property) allows you to even pet and take pictures with some of the famous stallions at stud who have produced winners whose names echo the lineage of the nobility they



come from.


As you drive along the miles and miles of roads of white and brown wood fencing or the even more impressive stone fencing, the green fields and happy horses encourage you to slow down and take a detour on to some less traveled roads. It becomes even more apparent of why Kentucky is the horse capital of the world with the continuous unfolding of horse farm after horse farm. You can get lost in the world and drift away into the luxury of horses and fencing and architecture that even non-horse people can appreciate.

Be sure to enjoy all that the Kentucky Horse Park has to offer! What a gem. The beautiful facilities make you want to submit an application for employment. From the breed demos (which includes one of our own Pasos), to the large barn (which contained the Budweiser Clydesdales during one of my visits as the KHP is a regular locale for the touring horses to stop en route to their next location) containing amazing carriages that are exhibited during the demos, to the wonderful Hall of Champions presentation where you get to see up close historic horses Cont. including Cigar (all-time leading money winner at retirement: \$9,999,815, Voted Racehorse of the Decade of the 1990s & tied Citation for the record of 16 consecutive wins) and Funny Cide (Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner), among others, to the 60,000 sq. ft. International Museum of the Horse which is an amazing presentation of all things horses that cannot be missed. The horse park has world class events going on year round and to sneak a peek at other horses being exhibited at the top level is worthwhile. 
There are also a number of other things to do


High Plains Annual Meeting and Trail Ride

2014 Super Horse Competition

They had an Open Gaited Division that was open to any gaited horse registered or not. At that time the competition included 9 classes over two days after many changes it ended up with 5 classes; Halter, Ranch Pleasure, Cutting, Working Cow and Trail.

They offered a clinic at the end of March to practice for the competition and to let the judges see the different gaits. It was a fun clinic with the afternoon being entirely cow work. The judge for the cow work was a cutting horse judge and competitor. She was quite amazed at Mr G and how he worked the cows. He was the first Paso she had ever seen.

I entered my gelding Guerrero de Primavera aka Mr G for the competition. In June we drove to Flying M in Mt Vernon, MO. The first class was Halter, Mr G has never been shown in a halter class but he set up nice and won the class.

The next day was real busy with the four remaining classes. First class was Ranch Pleasure, although he wasn't acting real well for me or the way I thought he should act, he still won the class.

It was fun to watch the spectators, mostly Foxtrotter people, as he went by they would lean over and



watch him go. SMOOTH! One Foxtrotter trainer told me it wore him out watching his feet move so fast. I just looked at him bouncing, head bobbing along and said back to him "He is smooth riding and he isn't sweating like your horse!" He laughed and agreed.

So after competing in the remaining classes and winning them all we were awarded the High Point Open Gaited Division Championship buckle!

Paso Fino Sport Horse Program (PFSH)

The Paso Fino Sport Horse Program showcases some of the Paso Fino breed's best ambassadors, and as a promotional tool, it can't be beat. Most new Paso Fino owners discover the breed through friends and seeing Paso Finos compete at open events.

The Paso Fino Sport Horse (PFSH) rewards both Riders and Horses that excel in all-breed competitions outside of the traditional Paso Fino horse community. As a participant in PFSH, you and your horse will accumulate points based on how you place in competitions and be rewarded for all of your achievements and hard work.

The horse must be registered with the Paso Fino Horse Association (PFHA) and Owner and Rider must be current members of PFHA for points to count.

An application form must be submitted each year prior to competing. A yearly fee of \$25 per horse must accompany the application. The show year will be the same as the PFHA show year September 1 – August 31.

A Sport Horse Entry Form must be filled out for each event and be postmarked to the PFHA office within 20 days of the competition. A copy of the prize list or program from each Sanctioned or Non-Sanctioned show entered must be submitted with your PFSH entry. To ensure a level playing field for all participants, a show prize list should include: rules and class specifications, dates, times, names of judges/officials and show secretary name and contact information, fees (entry fees, late fees, stall fees, etc.) and prizes. Please attach each prize list to the entry sheet for that show.

Shows may be Sanctioned or Non-Sanctioned (4-H and schooling shows are eligible), but shows and classes must be open to all breeds or all gaited breeds. Shows open only to or adjudicated by facility owners, family members, employees, boarders, or owners of horses in training at a single facility are not eligible for points.

Point Award System :

All classes, **except** fun classes, shall have points awarded to the entries placing first through sixth in regular classes and first through fourth in Championship classes. Points shall be doubled at Sanctioned shows.

Non-Sanctioned Points

1st- 6 points, 2nd-5 points, 3rd-4 points, 4th-3 points, 5th-2 points and 6th- 1 point.

Sanctioned Points

1st- 12 points, 2nd-10 points, 3rd-8 points, 4th-6 points, 5th-4 points and 6th-2 point.

Non-Sanctioned Championships : Champion-12 points, Reserve Champion-10 points, Third Champion-8 points and Fourth Champion-6 points.

Championships : Champion-24 points, Reserve Champion-20 points, Third Champion-16 points and Fourth Champion-12 points.

RULES

- o Participant must be an active member in good standings with the HPPFHA
- o Annual period considered is Oct 1 – Sept 30 of award period. Applications will be made annually; points will not be carried over.
- o Age divisions JR. 18 and under; SR 19-59; Golden 60 and over
- o Awards will be given to the horse & rider partners that have the highest points. **THERE IS A POTENTIAL FOR 3 AWARDS**
- o This is based on the honor system. Awards will be based on total number of points/team.
- o COST: \$5/yr for each horse/rider combination. There can be as many horse/rider combinations as desired and they may be added throughout the year.
- o HPPFHA sanctioned event is worth 2 points
- o Rescued Paso Fino gets 5 points: if rescued within one year prior to the program year or during the program year
- o Registered Paso Fino will get 5 points Horses do not have to be registered but will not get the 5 points. Rider does not have to own the horse being ridden.
- o Participant is a member of PFHA will receive 5 bonus points
- o Members who belong to PFHA/Recreational Rider will receive 5 bonus points. (one time only)
- o All other organized activities will receive 1 point (examples ACTHA, Clinics, Texas Trail Challenge, All breed shows, trail rides organized by other clubs, parades, drill teams, etc. Safe to ask for clarification)


